BOARD BRIEFS January 26, 2007

The Executive Board Meeting was held at California University of Pennsylvania on Friday, 26 January 2007. Following are the highlights:

- ♦ Evaluation results from the 2006 Annual Conference were reviewed and discussed as planning for the 2007 Annual Conference in Monroeville, PA begins.
- ♦ Todd Eicker, President, is currently preparing information to be posted on the web concerning the mission and organizational goals, electronic voting, and the webmaster position.
- ◆ Joe Puzycki, Treasurer, reported that the total assets are \$23,384.39.
- ◆ President Eicker appointed a Strategic Points Development Committee (Todd Eicker, Dave Wilson, Lynn Pierson, Brian Mauro, Jan Schumacher, and Charmaine Strong) and a Bylaw Review Committee is currently being organized.
- Membership Commission Chair, Mary Ellen Bayuk, reported 170 members. Graduate student numbers have declined; Graduate Student Liaison, John Mayo, will be addressing this trend.
- ◆ Spring Keystones are currently being planned the topic is "Sustainability Initiatives," a most current "hot topic." Dates for the Keystones are: 13 April (east) and 20 April (west).
- Discussion with Dr. Melissa Rychener, Slippery Rock University, on the Student Affairs Career Day which is co-sponsored by PCPA. PCPA is most interested in continuing the support of this event.
- Discussion of a draft proposal prepared by a Steering Committee to explore a "Great Lakes Student Affairs Journal." Concerns were raised; however, ongoing investigation was encouraged.
- ♦ Election process is unfolding. Brian Mauro reported that there are seven vacancies and the nominations were strong. Look for the upcoming online voting!
- ♦ Facebook users join the PCPA Friendship Group started by Ken Miller!

FIVE THINGS YOU CAN DO TO BE MORE SUSTAINABLE AT WORK (OR ON THE WAY TO WORK)

Reduce the number of miles you drive by walking, biking, carpooling or taking mass transit wherever possible

Avoiding just 10 miles of driving every week would eliminate about 500 pounds of carbon dioxide emissions a year! (www.climatecrisis.net)

Turn off electronic devices you're not using

Simply turning off your computer, fax, and copier each night (along with other electronics) will save you thousands of pounds of carbon dioxide a year. (www.climatecrisis.net)

Unplug electronics from the wall when you're not using them

Even when turned off, may electronics use energy. In fact, the energy used to keep display clocks lit and memory chips working accounts for 5 percent of total domestic energy consumption and spews 18 million tons of carbon into the atmosphere every year! (www.climatecrisis.net)

Go duplex

Purchase duplex printers that use both sides of paper.

Brainstorm

Spend some time brainstorming ways to make the office more sustainable during your next staff meeting.

10 THINGS YOU CAN DO TO STOP GLOBAL WARMING AT HOME

ACPA's Sustainability Taskforce

Educate yourself

Take opportunities to learn about sustainability and become literate in sustainable development.

Replace a regular incandescent light bulb with a compact fluorescent light bulb (cfl)

CFLs use 60% less energy than a regular bulb. This simple switch will save about 300 pounds of carbon dioxide a year. If every family in the U.S. made the switch, we'd reduce carbon dioxide by more than 90 billion pounds! (www.climatecrisis.net)

Move your thermostat down 2° in winter and up 2° in summer

Almost half of the energy we use in our homes goes to heating and cooling. You could save about 2,000 pounds of carbon dioxide a year with this simple adjustment. Programmable thermostats will automatically lower the heat or air conditioning at night and raise them again in the morning. They can save you \$100 a year on your energy bill. (www.climatecrisis.net)

Consume less

Consume less by using durable goods versus disposables or throwaways such as coffee mugs. Save resources by using reusable materials such as 100% recycled paper.

Use less hot water

It takes a lot of energy to heat water. You can use less hot water by installing a low flow showerhead (350 pounds of carbon dioxide saved per year) and washing your clothes in cold or warm water (500 pounds saved per year) instead of hot. (www.climatecrisis.net)

Be sure you're recycling at home

You can save 2,400 pounds of carbon dioxide a year by recycling half of the waste your household generates. (www.climatecrisis.net)

Buy locally grown and produced foods

The average meal in the United States travels 1,200 miles from the farm to your plate. Buying locally will save fuel and keep money in your community. (www.climatecrisis.net)

Buy organic foods as much as possible

Organic soils capture and store carbon dioxide at much higher levels than soils from conventional farms. If we grew all of our corn and soybeans organically, we'd remove 580 billion pounds of carbon dioxide from the atmosphere! (www.climatecrisis.net)

Be informed

Be informed about the political process and get involved!

Share with others

Share what you have learned with others and incorporate this knowledge into practice.

Encouragement and recognition of scholarly writing by graduate students on current issues in Student Affairs is the purpose of the award. Students in master's or doctoral programs are invited to participate.

The award is donated by Dr. Grady H. Roberts Jr., past president of PCPA, in memory of his parents. The winner will be announced at the Annual PCPA Conference in October. The amount of the award is \$1000.

Eligibility

Students must be:

- ◆ Enrolled in a graduate degree program for one or more semesters during the 2006-2007 school year. Verification is required.
- ♦ A current member of PCPA. (Student membership is \$10.)
- Planning to attend the annual PCPA fall conference.

Procedures

- The topic of the award is a major issue in Student Affairs.
- ◆ Submissions must not exceed ten (10) double-spaced, typewritten pages including references, tables, and figures, and should conform to the current American Psychological Association Publication Manual.
- ♦ Submit (2) copies of the manuscript.
- Entries will be judged on originality, clarity, significance of the topic to the field of Student Affairs, technical competence, and forcefulness of argument.



About the Locations:


Each seminar is being held in a LEED Certified building (the U.S. Green Building Council's Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design rating system).


